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options for students to become certified in different technical areas.

Off campus, GHS has students that attend vocational programs through Fort Scott and Coffeyville Community Colleges. Students who are Juniors and Seniors may attend partial day classes if they are on track with graduation requirements.

Crawford County Technical School, in partnership with Fort Scott Community College, offers classes in Masonry, HVAC, Construction and Welding. Students take these classes as part of their school day and earn both high school and college credit. Also offered through FSCC are classes in Cosmetology, Culinary Arts and Emergency Medical Technology.

Coffeyville Community College branch in Columbus offers Collision Repair Technology, Automotive Technology, and Certified Nursing Assistant classes that are open to high school students. Currently, GHS has several students enrolled in these classes. Students who complete vocational programs through these community colleges have the opportunity to graduate from high school with state and nationally certified credentials in their chosen field.

Girard Middle School students are also being exposed to the concept of career readiness. GMS 8th grade students recently participated in "Career Day". Thanks to 17 guest speakers, students were given insight into multiple career options, and then took a trip to the Fort Scott Building and Trades Center in Pittsburg, where they learned about several technical careers.

"Our 8th grade Career Day was an eye-opening experience for our youngsters," said GMS Principal Brannon Kidd. "It gave them a great opportunity to learn about professions they were interested in and what it would take to enter that profession. We are so thankful for all those who volunteered their time to share!"

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District Begins Process of Updating Strategic Plan

In the fall of 2012, Girard School District #248 began gathering input from school district stakeholders in order to create a 5-year District Strategic Plan. The creation of a District Strategic Plan is the first step in establishing and achieving concrete short- and long-term goals for a school district. Future financial, personnel, and facilities decisions can then be made based on their alignment to the plan and whether they are helping the district move toward the established goals.

Five years after this initial Strategic Plan was created, school district superintendent Blaise Bauer is pleased with the status of items determined to be needs for our district at that time.

"We are very proud as we look back on our first Strategic Plan and can see everything we were able to accomplish," said Bauer. "With our community's help, we addressed the issues that our district was facing, particularly facility concerns."

With the completion of the 5-year term for the Strategic Plan developed in 2012, the school district has begun working to create a new Strategic Plan that will guide them through the next five years.

Professional education consultant Dr. Chris Christman, who assisted the school district with the development of the first Strategic Plan, returned to help facilitate meetings with district stakeholders. Dr. Christman has met with groups representing Girard students, staff, parents, business leaders, community members and district patrons.

District patrons were also invited to take an online survey. This was a new tool that was not available during development of the first Strategic Plan. The results of the survey, along with information gathered at meetings, will be compiled and analyzed by the Board of Education and school administration and included in the updated Strategic Plan.

"We are excited to begin the process of developing a new Strategic Plan," said Bauer. "We've gathered some valuable feedback from patrons, and have already begun to address some items. Meeting the needs of our student body and maintaining a strong relationship with our community are our primarily goals, and these Strategic Plans are essential in achieving those goals."

In an effort to maintain and foster a positive school climate at GHS, the Building Leadership Team combined with student volunteers have started a program to focus on positive character traits coined "The Trojan Way". This process began after a Building Leadership Team meeting during which staff discussed the importance of maintaining a good school culture. Following this meeting, school staff met with multiple classes to gain input from students on what they believe are important attributes of a GHS Trojan.

The traits identified by students and staff were as follows:

- · Respect, Empathy and Acceptance
- Perseverance and Work Ethic
- · Honesty, Accountability and Ownership
- Humility, Kindness and Courtesy
- · Selflessness and Teamwork
- · Courage and Honor

While meeting with students, one of the ideas suggested was to start a new group that is student-driven and focuses on these traits. From this suggestion, the school created the Trojan Ambassadors, which will lead activities within the district that will reinforce the traits important to the Trojan Way. This group will focus on one set of traits each month. They began in November with Respect, Empathy and Acceptance. Student volunteers made posters that are visible around the school and shared quotes during morning announcements. Currently, students are developing plans to talk with middle and elementary school students about these concepts in an effort to establish the Trojan Way throughout the district.

One of the greatest assets of high school graduates, as identified by potential employers, are quality "soft skills," which this program will emphasize. We anticipate that the Trojan Way program will not only help maintain a good school climate, but will also increase students' employability and life skills.
