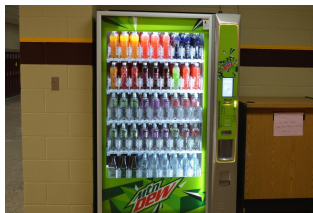

IPAD LOCKDOWN

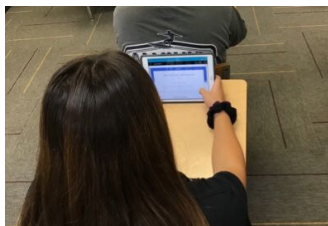
